

Draft Housing Adaptations Policy consultation

Background

The link between housing and wellbeing is increasingly acknowledged. A suitable, well adapted home can improve quality of life, wellbeing, enable safe access and increase independence to prevent, reduce or delay care needs.

This draft policy sets out how Southampton City Council aims to approach requests for property disabled adaptations to the homes of Council residents.

- > The aims and commitments of the policy;
- > The proposed eligibility criteria for housing adaptations;
- > If and how alternative options to larger-scale adaptations are considered, and;
- > The proposed application process and how applications are decided.

Aims & commitments

Broadly speaking, the proposed aims and commitments of the draft policy can be summarised as:

- > Ensuring all residents have access to accommodation that enables independent living, privacy and dignity;
- > Maximising the impact of available funding by delivering best value;
- > Provide a service that seeks to meet the needs experienced and identified by a person with a disability, with regard to the person's own views, wishes and feelings;
- > The acceptability of adaptations are measured by the extent to which they meet the needs of the individual:
- > Each case to be considered in the context of the policy framework to ensure consistency and fairness, and;
- > Each case to be considered on its merits, paying due regard to individual circumstances.

The draft policy says that other options would be considered if the requested adaptations are extensive or complicated. Alternative options could include offering the applicant(s) a more suitable council property, or a sheltered or extra care home.

According to the draft policy, the Council would always discuss any alternative options with the applicant(s) and would ensure that any property, if offered, would meet a set of suitability criteria.

Applications process & governance

Broadly speaking, the process described in the draft policy can be summarised as:

- 1) Receiving a referral, either an application directly from the tenant themselves or from SCC teams in areas like Wellbeing & Adults or Children's Social Care;
- 2) Having an assessment carried out by Housing Occupational Therapists (OTs) and/or Occupational Therapy Assistants (OTAs);
- 3) Getting a recommendation(s) from OTs and/or OTAs, working alongside other professionals like Charge Hands and architects, then;
- 4) A final decision by the Housing Management service.

The draft policy also covers other aspects related to the application process, including:

- > Who the decision-makers are and the cost thresholds for final decisions: the Head of Supported Housing for works under £7,500; the Housing Adaptations Panel (HAP) for works £7,500 or more;
- > Membership of the Housing Adaptations Panel;
- > Examples of what can normally be considered as major or minor adaptations;
- > Circumstances where an adaptation will be refused, including if works are unlikely to meet the applicant's long-term housing needs, if the estimated cost is £30,000 or more, and if a tenant is in rent arrears;
- > Exceptional circumstances where a more significant adaptation may be accepted, including the discretionary powers of the Director of Housing to approve works of more than £30,000 (assessed on a case-by-case basis);
- > The commitment to matching the provision for those living in SCC social housing with the private sector (where possible);
- > Prioritisation and waiting times, including definitions of priority cases (e.g. where the client has a palliative diagnosis, or a hospital discharge would be delayed without the adaptations, etc), and;
- > How adaptations impact on tenancies, including the expectation that where works cost more than £2,500, the tenant with disabilities remains living at the property for a minimum of five years.
