BYE-LAWS

With respect to Street Cries.

Whereas, by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted "that the Council may from "time to time make such Bye-Laws as to them "seem meet, for the good rule and government of "the borough, and for the prevention and sup-"pression of nuisances not already punishable in a "summary manner by virtue of any Act in force "throughout the Borough, and may thereby appoint "such fines, not exceeding in any case five pounds, "as they deem necessary for the prevention and "suppression of offences against the same."

Now, therefore, the Council of the County Borough of Southampton, in pursuance of the powers aforesaid, at a Meeting duly held on the 9th day of May, 1900, at which meeting 45 members of the Council (being more than two-thirds of the whole number of the Council) are present, do hereby make the following Bye-Laws, viz.:—

- 1.—No person shall, for the purpose of selling newspapers or other articles, call or shout in any street so as to cause annoyance to the inhabitants of the neighbourhood.
- 2.—Any person offending against the foregoing Bye Law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.
